## Appendix 1

### Meeting to discuss cycling issues in Holmes Chapel 2<sup>nd</sup> August 2019

**Attending:** Hazel Sutcliffe (HCP), Mike Blomeley (HCPC)

**Background:** The HC Partnership & SECCAG have promoted the principles of safe cycling routes around the village to avoid main roads, however a number of obstacles still exist where through routes are not possible or are restricted. They have also identified a number of improvement actions.

CEC has a cycling strategy which promotes and encourages cycling as an environmentally friendly, healthy activity, but little improvement has been delivered. The new administration has declared it will increase spending on improvements to the highways system to encourage safe cycling.

The HC Parish Council has recognised the benefits of cycling within the community and has highlighted both the current risks to cyclists and need for improvements.

**Meeting purpose:** an exchange of views and discussion of possible options to create / enhance safe cycling routes in the village.

#### **Suggested actions:**

1. The proposed path from Cotton's estate to Ravenscroft should be suitable for cyclists and pedestrians. (JAC/Amenities)
2. The suggested access from the Toucan crossing on Middlewich Road to the "Lakes" estate should be cycle compliant. (JAC/Amenities)
3. The access to the "Lakes" estate from the Puffin crossing on Middlewich Road needs improving for pedestrians, cyclists & disabled users (remove "chicane") (MEB/VI)
4. Footway link between Moreton Drive & Sadler's Close requires widening to permit cycle access. Land acquisition necessary, but land owner is willing to assist. (MEB/VI)

The above four items would help encourage cycling to school, particularly HCCS which could help reduce traffic congestion

5. Widen footway / create cycle lane on Manor Lane to permit safer cycling. (MEB/VI)
6. Proposed development at Victoria Mills should ensure a cycle compliant access is provided to Eastgate. Any proposals for a bridge across the railway should accommodate cyclists and pedestrians. (BB/SPSC)
7. Improve the access from London Road to Portree Drive to facilitate cyclists. (MEB/VI)
8. A dropped kerb into Bromley Drive from London Road should be provided. (MEB/VI)
9. Remove cycle barriers on existing footways that are otherwise suitable for cycle use. (MEB/VI)
10. Provide signs to indicate safe cycling routes around the village. (MEB/VI)
11. T & T Group to consider provision of a cycle lane in the proposed pedestrian improvement scheme on London Road. This would need to reflect the proposals in the roundabout scheme and ideally extend south along London Road to the Bloor estate at Bluebell Wood. (MEB/T&T)
12. Proposed new bridge over River Dane from Dane Meadow to Cranage should be cycle compliant. This would provide a key north/south link away from busy roads. (BB/SPSC)

This scheme was suggested some years ago but proved impractical. It could be well worth considering again, although funding would be a key issue.

Many of the above suggestions would need the active support of Cheshire East to deliver. Prior to any submissions being made, it is suggested the relevant PC Committees consider and comment on them so that a formal submission to CEC can be compiled in co-operation with the Partnership.

### Background / Information

The Parish Council has spent a considerable time trying to make progress with Persimmon Homes in an attempt to secure a safe walking and cycling route to the village centre via the Ravenscroft Estate. This had been part of the original planning documents as a 'potential path'. The objections to achieving this according to Persimmon are:

1. Persimmon have no obligation to extend the path beyond the current development and have fulfilled all the planning requirements
2. The Toucan crossing across Middlewich Road satisfies any sustainability requirements and was agreed with CEC as part of the planning process. A figure of £100k was provided by Persimmon as part of the S106 agreement.
3. To provide a link now would require a re-planning of the site and a new planning application.
4. Persimmon are under a legal obligation to preserve the right of way along the track to the equestrian centre. A footpath would negatively impact on this.
5. A footpath along the track would constitute a health and safety hazard from the traffic to and from the equestrian centre.

The view of the HCPC is that a safe route could be established although as a result of the current site plan it would involve constructing a footpath at a significant cost. For the PC view to prevail the following actions would need to be completed:

1. Demonstrate that the path would not represent a H&S hazard
2. Obtain support of Persimmon for the creation of a path on their land
3. Obtain permission from Seddons Homes to cross a narrow stretch of their land onto the Ravenscroft estate. (already obtained but not legally documented)
4. Obtain planning permission from CEC for the creation of the path.

We have reached a stage, based on the email to us from Persimmon on 27 August 2019 that no progress will be made unless we can show that planning permission could be obtained from CEC for such a path. Even then we would need the good will of Persimmon to construct the path on their land and funding to carry out the work. Issuing a press release at this stage is unlikely to produce the result we are after.

### Proposal

It is proposed that we contact Persimmon and ask two questions

- a) Have they completed the work agreed in the travel plan (part of the planning application) to investigate a pedestrian/cycle route between the site and Ravenscroft as an alternative route to walking alongside the A54

- b) What evidence of traffic flows do they base their assertion that the footpath along the track would constitute a H&S hazard?

Secondly that the PC fund a pre-planning meeting with CEC Planning Department to assess the likelihood of obtaining planning permission for such a scheme. This is likely to be under the minor operations pre-planning application scheme, which is a cost of £200 (inc VAT) per meeting.
